Svenja Marie Linnemann is MA student at the Department of Social Sciences, at Humboldt University Berlin and a political activist. Her studies focus on qualitative and quantitative empirical social research, urban sociology and the topics of migration and refugees. She was awarded the Georg-Simmel-Prize for the best Bachelor thesis in 2015 by the Georg Simmel Centre for Metropolitan Studies.

Agathe Menetrier has studied political science at Sciences Po Paris with a major in Human Rights and Humanitarian Action. She holds a master in Social Sciences from Humboldt University. Her masters thesis was supervised by Prof. Yurdakul and Prof. von Braunmühl and was dedicated to the study of the implementation of 'gender mainstreaming' guidelines in practices of refugee assistance in Dakar, Senegal. She is currently preparing a PhD at the Max Planck Institute for Social Anthropology as part of the research group 'Integration and Conflict along the Upper Guinea Coast'.

Frédéric Bocquet studied law at Grenoble, Paris-Nanterre, Frankfurt am Main and Paris-Descartes Universities, and specialized in International Public Law and Human Rights. He worked as assistant lecturer at Marmara University in Istanbul for over 2 years before beginning a career in the international cooperation sector. He worked on European projects in Paris and Warsaw, before turning to a humanitarian approach with several NGOs, working in countries such as Pakistan, Chad, DR Congo, the Palestinian Territories, Afghanistan, Myanmar, and the Philippines. The projects concerned economic development, agriculture and public health, often for the benefit of refugees or displaced persons. Based in Berlin since 2004, he is now Country Director for Médecins du Monde in Algeria, a mission which supports migrant populations and exploited women, in particular regarding their access to health services and respect of their rights.
