Abstract:

The transmission of Islamic knowledge and the institutionalisation of Islamic education became highly debated issues in Europe in recent years. The contributions in this panel will deal with different forms and institutions of Islamic education. Based on empirical studies and data from countries like Germany, Great Britain, France and the Netherlands they will discuss Islamic religious education for children either at school or in the mosque, the training of religious personnel

like imams or teachers for Islamic instruction, as well as the establishment of faith based Islamic schools or Islamic institutions of higher learning in Europe.
